

Welcome to Bury Knowle Park

This beautiful park, in the centre of Headington, is open 24 hours a day, all year.

History

Oxford City Council purchased Bury Knowle House and its extensive grounds in 1930 from Henry Beaufoy the owner of Henry Beaufoy & Co Vinegar Manufacturers of Lambeth.

The park was opened to the public on 2nd April 1932 and is approximately 7 hectares. Some of the features and trees in the park such as the Ha Ha and the large Chestnut near the play area may date from the original landscaping.



Bury Knowle Park is home to a number of sculptures including an art sculpture in the park known as The Wheel of Hope and 'The Story Book Tree, which was based on stories by C.S.Lewis and Tolkin, a book releases a horse, a lion and a dragon which sparks children's interest and imagination.

Bury Knowle House has been home to the local library since 1934.
