I am delighted to hear the progress of the Oxfordshire Place Based Sustainable Growth Package deal. I therefore wish to indicate most strongly to the Oxfordshire Growth Board that the University whole-heartedly supports the package and urges the continued partnership working with Central Government to unlock the funds that will enable the actions outlined in the proposal, as well as investment in activities that directly drive productivity.

The University has achieved the top position in the World by Times Higher Education World University Rankings for the second year running. We recognise that our efforts working with regional partners in securing a deal are vital. The University and the region have a codependence on one another that is crucial for each other's success.
