Please find below my Comment Form as requested. My comment is below: If this needs to be submitted in another form, please let me know.

Any development at Land at Meadow Lane (known locally as the Horse Fields) would be unsustainable and cannot be developed in a viable fashion in accordance with local and national policy. This makes the allocation unsound, and site SPS8 should be deleted from LP 2045.

The residents of Iffley Village and surrounds, plus many *thousands* of people who enjoy the Quiet Route, the biodiversity, the tranquillity of Meadow Lane, have held steady for years (and will continue to hold steady) in our objection to inappropriate and *unsafe* building on this site. Friends of Iffley Village committee have offered an innovative use for the field: The Meadow School, which will educate children from five or more schools as to the biodiversity in the field.

Climate catastrophe is with us now. More destruction of green spaces only speeds it up.

The Oxford City Council owes it to those who elected its members by being ahead of itself in policies for Oxford. Allocating this field to housing that would be better placed elsewhere is a policy from the past.
