The Draft Oxford Local Plan 2045 is ‘Unsound’

The Draft Local Plan is ‘Unsound’ because its ‘public consultation’ which should have been designed to ask people’s views of the proposed policies instead, by misleading wording, led people to agree to a policy which, had it been expressed more clearly, they would never have agreed to.

Background

The people of Oxford love their green spaces. Green space is one of the reasons people cite for enjoying living in Oxford and coming to work here in the new labs, colleges and other places of employment.

Local residents support their green spaces with positive action, working on them on a voluntary basis. There are numerous ‘Friends of’ groups which help look after and enhance our parks eg Friends of Bury Knowle Park, Friends of Cutteslowe Park, our nature reserves eg Friends of Lye Valley, Friends of Raleigh Park, Friends of Chilswell Valley, Friends of Meadow Lane Nature Park, Friends of Warneford Meadow, our closed churchyards eg Friends of St Mary and John Churchyard as well as Neighbourhood groups who guard their green spaces fiercely eg Friends of Old Headington, Friends of Quarry, Divinity Road Residents’ Association. In addition there are around 30 allotment sites which have for years been managed voluntarily by their members – unlike many cities where they are Council managed.

In fact, when Headington Neighbourhood Forum conducted a survey – the most thorough ever conducted in Headington, and possibly in the whole of Oxford, to make a valid foundation for the Headington Neighbourhood Plan, the issue which received the most support – way above Transport, Housing or Education was:

Conserve Green Spaces, and increase biodiversity and public access.

So public support for conserving and enhancing green spaces in Oxford cannot be doubted.

The Flawed Oxford City Council’s Public Consultation Survey

The Council published two on-line surveys. One was a ‘short’ or ‘quick’ survey, presumably intended to appeal to people without the time to plough through detailed paperwork. The other was longer. The short

survey, coloured orange and green, was printed and dropped through residents' doors.

Under the heading, 'Taking Care of our Environment.' It states:

'We are protecting our important green spaces and features' and then asks how strongly people agree with this approach. Given the local affection for green spaces, who could disagree? What it does NOT make clear is that the Council is not referring to **all** our green spaces, so important for the mental and physical well-being of people. **It is referring only to the green spaces the Council considers important**, specifically those they are legally obliged retain like SSSIs, SACs etc. The rest are unprotected and presumably available for development should the Council wish to do so, on the pretext that the 'need' for development outweighs any amenity value. This is explained in the online documentation.

This survey question is deliberately misleading. It asks people to endorse a Local Plan policy which they would almost certainly reject if they knew what it really meant.

This is undemocratic and unethical and casts into doubt the value of the whole 'public consultation ' with it's strident cry, ' Let us have your views.'

In short, the draft 2042 Local Plan is unsound owing to the faulty process of Public Consultation which underpins it.

The Plan has three overarching objectives which guide policy making throughout the Neighbourhood Plan process. These are:

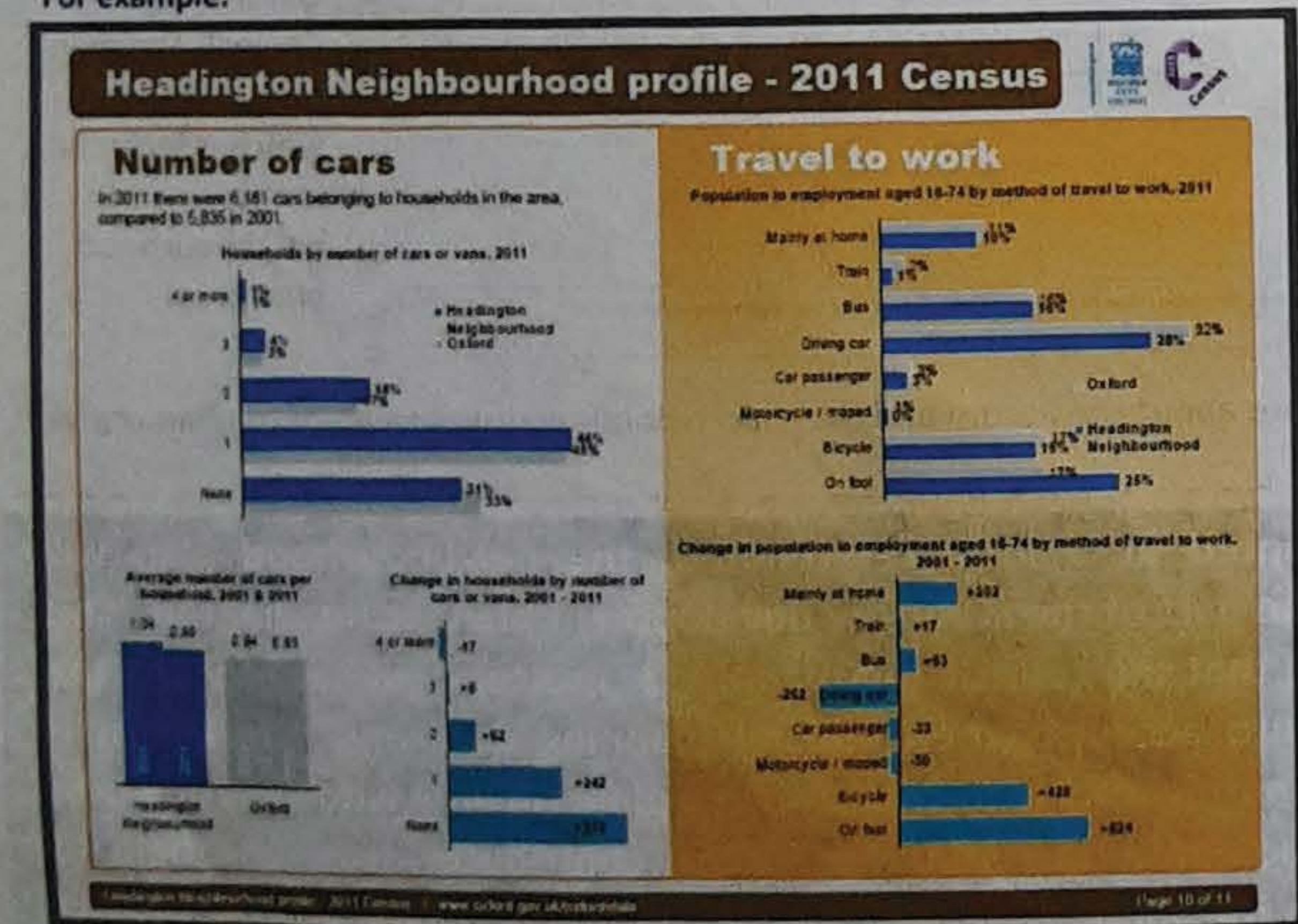
1. Improving the quality of life for residents, workers and students

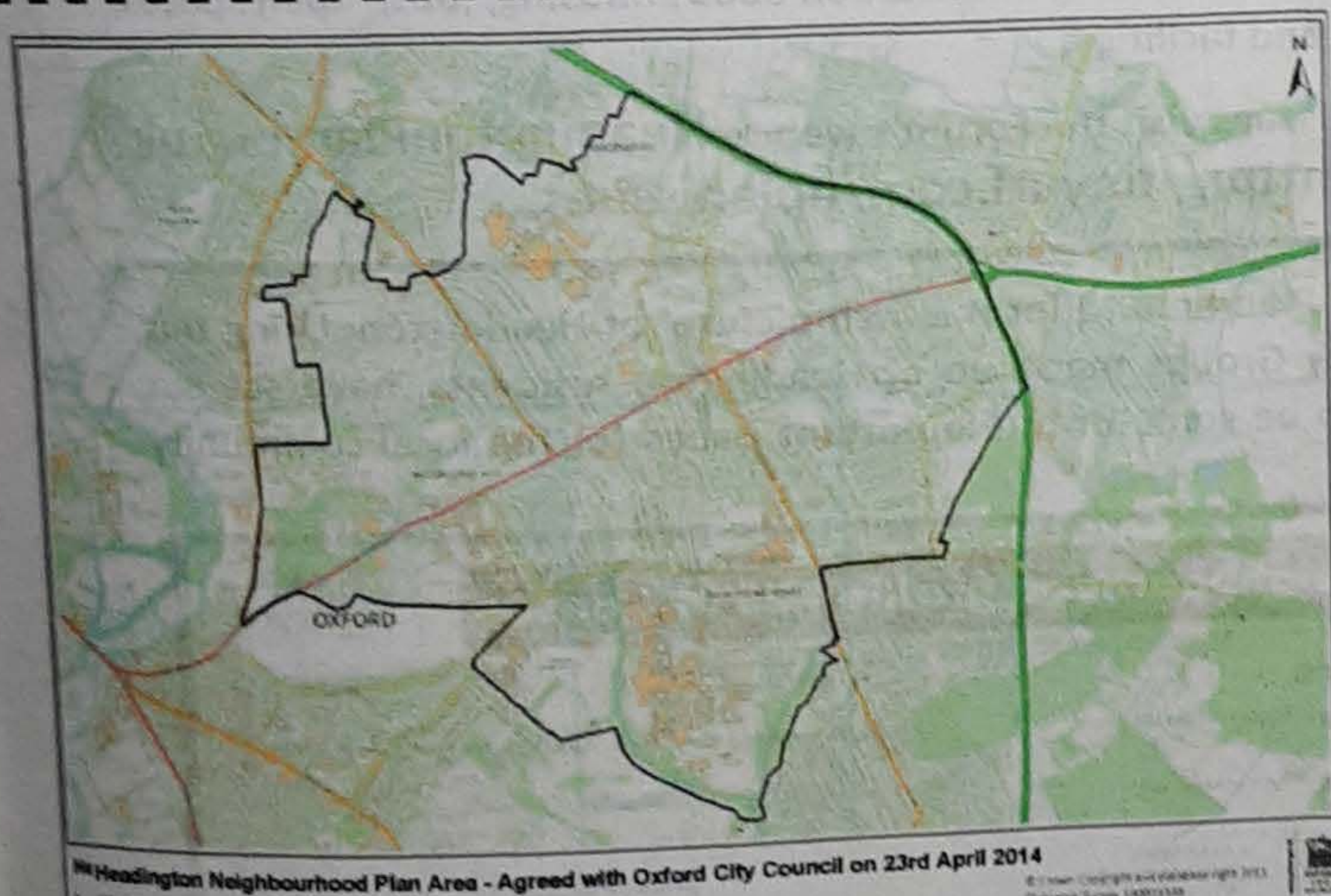

Since April 2012, local communities have been able to take a lead in the future planning of their area through the preparation of neighbourhood plans.



Headington Neighbourhood Plan area was agreed through Consultation with residents, and approved by Oxford City Council. The map shows the area which is included in the neighbourhood plan area.
