



**Duty to Cooperate Scoping Statement – Updated version
following consultation on the first draft Scoping Statement,
Regulation 18 consultation and change to the plan period**

Oxford Local Plan 2045

October 2025

1. Introduction

Purpose of this Document

This document seeks to identify the matters and topics relevant to the Oxford Local Plan 2045 that are identified as strategic matters that cross administrative boundaries, and which therefore fall under the Duty to Cooperate. It also identifies those bodies with which cooperation is necessary because Oxford City Council has a duty to engage them and outlines key meetings where relevant matters and topics are raised. This version of the document has been updated following consultation on the first draft scoping statement and consultation on the Oxford Local Plan 2042 at Regulation 18 stage. It is also updated to reflect the proposed change in plan period from 2022-2042 to 2025-2045.

The City Council has sought to identify which Duty to Cooperate bodies will seek to be involved in discussions on which strategic issues related to the Oxford Local Plan 2045. An earlier version of this document was consulted on to confirm that the correct strategic matters and bodies relevant to these have been identified. The document has been updated to reflect comments received in response to consultation on the first version of this document, the changed plan period, and updates to the evidence base. Although no change in anticipated duty to cooperate issues has been identified, it is requested that other bodies should raise any additional issues now that will assist. It will then be kept up to date as the project continues and as Duty to Cooperate (and other) discussions progress and the evidence base is prepared. The document itself will form part of the evidence base for the Local Plan 2045.

Keeping the Document Updated

This document will continue to be updated as Oxford City Council engages with the Duty to Cooperate bodies and discusses cross-boundary strategic matters. New strategic matters identified as discussions progress may be added and there may be matters identified here that are later considered to no longer constitute 'cross boundary strategic issues'. No additional strategic matters have been identified that need adding to this version of the Scoping Statement.

2. Requirements of the Duty to Cooperate

Duty to Cooperate Bodies

The Duty to Cooperate is a requirement of the Localism Act 2011 and the National Planning Policy Framework.

It requires Local Planning Authorities and other prescribed bodies to engage, with a view to maximising the effectiveness of the preparation of development plan documents and other activities so far as they relate to strategic matters.

This is normally most important in considering strategic issues such as the location of development and availability of strategic infrastructure; however, other matters and topics may also be identified that are relevant.

It requires on-going, constructive, and active engagement on the preparation of development plan documents and other activities. It is a 'duty to cooperate' not a 'duty to agree', but there must be genuine, positive, and continuous dialogue with the intention of reaching agreement.

The legal basis for the Duty is set out in Section 110 of the Localism Act, which inserts Section 33A into the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004. It applies to all local planning authorities, National Park authorities and county councils in England, and to a number of other public bodies. The Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2012 specify which bodies this duty applies to.

Local planning authorities are bound by a statutory duty to cooperate. Plan making bodies are expected to cooperate with each other when preparing or supporting the preparation of policies which address strategic matters including those policies of Local Plans.

The NPPF states that the relevant planning authorities should produce, maintain, and update one or more statements(s) of common ground throughout their plan-making process. Oxford City Council have identified that a number of statements of common ground are likely to be produced on particular issues and with particular bodies who are most relevant to the duty to cooperate.

The bodies that the City Council will attempt to produce a joint or individual Statement of Common Ground with will include:

- Oxfordshire County Council
- Cherwell District Council
- West Oxfordshire District Council
- South Oxfordshire District Council
- Vale of White Horse District Council

In addition to the adjoining authorities, the bodies prescribed for the purposes of section 33A(1)(c) of the Act, as set out in The Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012 (as amended) and identified by the City Council as relevant to Oxford are:

- The Environment Agency;
- Historic England;
- Natural England;
- Homes England;
- Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire, and Berkshire West Integrated Care Board;
- The National Health Service Commissioning Board (NHS England);
- The Office of Rail and Road;
- The Highways Authority (Oxfordshire County Council);
- Civil Aviation Authority;
- National Highways.

Plan making authorities that are potentially linked but not adjacent to Oxford will also be contacted, including potentially the local planning authorities for Swindon, Aylesbury, West Berkshire, and Reading.

National Planning Practice Guidance states that Local Enterprise Partnerships and Local Nature Partnerships are not subject to the requirements of the duty, however, local planning authorities and county councils in England, and prescribed public bodies, must cooperate with them. Local planning authorities must have regard to their activities when they are preparing their local plans, so long as those activities are relevant to plan-making. (See: National Planning Policy Framework on Plan-Making <https://www.gov.uk/guidance/plan-making>. Paragraph: 030. Reference ID: 61-030-20190315).

Oxford City Council have identified the following:

- Oxfordshire Local Enterprise Partnership (now OxLEP Ltd and owned by Oxfordshire County Council);
- Oxfordshire Local Nature Partnership.

Other Duty to Cooperate bodies specified in the Regulations 2012 but do not currently apply in the context of Oxford are: the Mayor of London, Transport for London, Integrated Transport Authorities, and the Marine Management Organisation.

The Localism Act 2011, Section 110 (2) states that each body should “*engage constructively, actively and on an ongoing basis...*” on strategic matters. The relevant activities include preparation of a development plan document (S110, 3) and strategic matters are defined in Section 110 (4).

In addition to the legal requirements set out above, the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF, December 2024) emphasises the importance of joint working and cooperation between local authorities and other agencies on cross boundary issues and issues of shared interest. The NPPF December 2024 sets out that:

- Local planning authorities are “*under a duty to cooperate with each other, and with other prescribed bodies, on strategic matters that cross administrative boundaries.*” (Paragraph 24).
- Strategic policy-making authorities should “*collaborate to identify the relevant strategic matters which they need to address in their plans.*” (Paragraph 25).
- “*Effective and on-going joint working between strategic policy-making authorities and relevant bodies is integral to the production of a positively prepared and justified strategy. In particular, joint working should help to determine where additional infrastructure is necessary, and whether development needs that cannot be met wholly within a particular plan area could be met elsewhere.*” (Paragraph 26).
- A consistent approach should be taken to planning delivery of major infrastructure including strategic health, education and other social infrastructure and plan policies should align as fully as possible with those of other bodies where a strategic relationship exists on these matters and consider the relevant investment plans of infrastructure providers (paragraph 27).
- “*In order to demonstrate effective and on-going joint working, strategic policymaking authorities should prepare and maintain one or more statements of common ground, documenting the cross-boundary matters being addressed and progress in cooperating to address these.*” (Paragraph 28).

There is further practical guidance in the Planning Practice Guidance.

3. Strategic matters

Strategic matters applicable to the Oxford Local Plan 2045 have been identified as follows. Where appropriate, some of these issues will be subject to specific statements of common ground to cover more detail and where there are areas of disagreement and agreement that need to be explained.

Oxford City Council has identified ten potential strategic matters that cross administrative boundaries. These are grouped into four overarching categories, as follows, but it should be noted that it is the 10 subcategories that are the potential strategic matters:

- Housing need and supply
- Economy

- Infrastructure needs
- Environment issues

1 Housing Need and Supply

1a Overall Housing Need, Supply and Unmet Housing need

Housing needs and supply is one of the top issues that the Local Plan must address, and where the duty to cooperate is essential. The NPPF states that authorities must work to address their housing needs. It also expects authorities to cooperate on meeting one another's housing needs if it cannot be accommodated within the authority where it arises. Local plans must also achieve sustainable development by pursuing the three main economic, social, and environmental objectives in mutually supportive ways (opportunities must be taken to secure net gains across each of the objectives).

The standard method calculation of housing need in Oxford finds the housing need to be 1,087 dwellings per annum, which is 21,740 over the plan period. This is significantly higher than any year of housing delivery since AMR recording began (2006). Since the base date of the Oxford Local Plan 2036, the greatest number of homes delivered annually was 790 in 2019 and the fewest was 365 in 2023/34 and 357 in 2017/18. The average over the first 8 years of the OLP2036 is 518pa.

The currently adopted Oxford Local Plan 2036 took a “no-stone-unturned” approach to finding sites for housing and ensuring efficient use of land. Whilst every effort will continue to be made to find capacity for housing, balanced against other key considerations of the spatial strategy, it is almost certain that there will be some unmet housing need arising from the Oxford Local Plan 2045. **This is confirmed by the capacity work to date, and a formal request for help meeting unmet housing needs will be sent to neighbouring authorities shortly.**

This is a strategic matter that will cross administrative boundaries that will, therefore, require ongoing constructive discussion on a Duty to Cooperate basis throughout the preparation of the Local Plan.

1b Specialist Accommodation Needs

The matter of need for specialist accommodation types is also of strategic interest in some cases, in particular the need for extra care housing and other similar housing types is a matter of discussion with the County Council.

The nature of provision for gypsies and travellers means that it is often a cross-boundary matter. Oxford currently has no Gypsy & Traveller sites; however, there are several sites close to Oxford's boundary. In recent years, the Oxfordshire authorities have cooperated on planning for gypsies and travellers, and this cooperation has continued through the jointly commissioned county-wide needs assessment that will form part of the evidence base for all the Oxfordshire planning authorities.

2 Economy and employment

2a Economic Need and Supply

Another issue for the Local Plan will be managing economic growth, ensuring that the city can continue to play its role in the local and national economy. Oxford is also a city of considerable international importance in a range of economic sectors and as such there are considerable added value benefits for the overall national economy, which go far beyond the benefits of other cities of a similar size in the United Kingdom. The regional Oxfordshire economy also benefits from having Oxford at its centre, with its associated effects resulting in one of the strongest economies in the UK as a net contributor to the exchequer.

The Oxfordshire Local Enterprise Partnership (OxLEP) developed the Oxfordshire Local Industrial Strategy (LIS) in partnership with the business community, academic institutions, and the other Oxfordshire local authorities. In addition, the Strategic Economic Plan 2023-2033 (SEP) (OxLEP) is a statement of the economic priorities for Oxfordshire, with the aim of championing good, sustainable growth. Close working with the other Oxfordshire local authorities and OxLEP Ltd will be required in this area. However, Oxford's reach as a location to work goes beyond the Oxfordshire authorities, and cooperation with a wide range of other local authorities and other bodies occurs through meetings relating to the Oxford-Cambridge Partnership. Oxford is within the Oxford-Cambridge growth corridor, and an Oxford Growth Commission has been set up. The Local Plan must respond to Oxford's position at the heart of an area of economic growth, and this therefore becomes a Duty to Cooperate issue.

2b Provision of Retail, Leisure, and Other Commercial Development

Oxford city centre plays an important sub-regional role and co-operation with neighbouring authorities is essential as current and future populations will not shop or access leisure facilities exclusively in their own areas but will travel to others.

3 Infrastructure provision and Cowley Branch Line

3a Provision of Security, Education, Community and Cultural Infrastructure and Other Local Facilities

Neighbouring authorities, Oxfordshire County Council and Homes England are important to involve in the development of the Local Plan in this field.

3b Provision of Infrastructure for Transport

Planning for strategic transport infrastructure requires cross boundary cooperation and is a strategic matter.

Oxfordshire County Council is the highways authority, which is responsible for producing the Local Transport Plan. Neighbouring authorities also have an important role to play in these matters. National Highways is responsible for the strategic road network, including the A34. Oxford has an important location on the rail network and there are significant improvement works taking place and planned in the area, including Cowley Branch Line proposals, and so the Office of Rail and Road, Oxfordshire County Council and South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse are engaged with in this regard.

3c Provision of Utilities Infrastructure (including telecommunications, waste, water, and energy)

A range of Duty to Cooperate bodies including the County Council, neighbouring authorities and the Environment Agency participate in framing the policies and proposals of the Local Plan in this regard. In addition, other bodies (outside of the duty to cooperate) including Thames Water and energy and telecoms providers are involved. Updates to the Infrastructure Delivery Plan (IDP) will reflect the discussions that have taken place and the conclusions drawn in relation to utilities infrastructure needs and delivery.

3d Provision of Health Infrastructure and Local Facilities

Oxford is a regionally (and nationally) important location for health and medical research. Its hospitals serve a very wide catchment area. At the local level Oxfordshire County Council has responsibility for public health and will be consulted whilst framing the policies of the Local Plan. Discussions will be held with The Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Berkshire West ICB and well as with the NHS hospital trusts.

4 Environment and climate change

4a Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Including Flood Risk

Work across local government boundaries on climate change adaptation may make this a duty to cooperate matter. Managing flood risk will be a key element of Oxford's climate change mitigation plans. Large parts of the city of Oxford are at risk of flooding so careful attention will need to be paid to this when drafting the policies and proposals of the Local Plan. The Environment Agency is a key Duty to Cooperate body in this regard and will be consulted throughout. Oxfordshire County Council (as Local Flood Authority) and Thames Water (although not a Duty to Cooperate body) also have important roles regarding this issue. There are plans for a major flood alleviation scheme in the Oxford area (Oxford Flood Alleviation Scheme), and cooperation with the Environment Agency and County Council is required on this matter. Waterbodies in Oxford have catchments and floodplains in the neighbouring authorities, so they are also relevant authorities to talk to.

4b Conservation and Enhancement of the Natural and Historic Environment, Including Landscape

Oxford has a wealth of historic buildings and valuable landscapes that need careful consideration in the Local Plan. Historic England has a key role to play in terms of the built heritage and the views into and through the city and the famous spires; they will be consulted on policy drafting and background evidence. Oxford has a Special Area of Conservation at Oxford Meadows, this a European level protection and as such Natural England will be key to inputting into and assessing policies and proposals that may have an impact on that site. The Local Nature Partnership also have a role to play in the wider natural environment topic. The hydrological catchment for some SSSIs could extend outside the boundaries. The Oxford Green Belt covers a significant amount of the green space within Oxford and is relevant to the setting of Oxford and as it extends beyond the city is also potentially relevant to neighbouring authorities.

4. Mechanisms for cooperation

Regular Partnership Meetings

The City Council is actively involved in a number of cross boundary and joint partnership relationships which will inform the preparation of the Local Plan. Many of these are formalised, regular meetings or forums where a variety of topics are discussed, some of these may be tailored for the purposes of producing local plans.

These existing partnerships are an invaluable mechanism for facilitating Duty to Cooperate discussions. They enable regular direct contact with a range of Duty to Cooperate bodies and other bodies relevant to strategic priorities. It is likely that several of these partnerships will actively follow progress of the Local Plan, making it a standing agenda item at meetings and dedicating agenda time to discussing emerging work.

Table 1 sets out details of regular partnership meetings (including their frequency and role) that have a direct relevance to the Local Plan project. In future versions of this document, this table will be updated to include details of specific conversations related to the project.

Joint working on strategies and infrastructure planning

Many of the partnerships detailed above have produced and adopted/published joint strategies as part of their work, consistent with the requirements of the Duty of Cooperate. Many of these strategies have direct relevance to the Local Plan.

Table 2 details many of the jointly produced strategies and jointly commissioned studies that relate to the Local Plan. Strategies and documents that were produced by or commissioned by at least one prescribed body for the Duty to Cooperate are shaded grey in the first

column. In future versions of this document, this table will be updated to include new strategies and evidence base documents related to the project.

Local Plan Meetings with External Stakeholders

Additionally, it was agreed that for a number of sites which the EA has concerns on, which the Council does not consider warranting of a full SFRA level 2 assessment, a high-level assessment of flood risk for these sites would be presented as part of SFRA (e.g. in appendix) to document the rationale.

Other Duty to Cooperate Bodies

Other duty to cooperate bodies were consulted on the Scoping Statement on 21st March 2025. Responses to this consultation have led to changes to the Duty to Cooperate Statement where it was considered that more clarity could be given, that an issue could be expanded, or a body added as relevant to a particular topic. The duty to cooperate bodies were consulted at the Regulation 18 consultation. Following the Regulation 18 consultation and number of meetings have been arranged to ensure duty to cooperate bodies are involved in information the Regulation 19 in relation to strategic matters or relevance to them.
